We said a fond farewell to Babette Cabral, who was our co-director many years ago, and Gay Hagen, our volunteer chair. We wished board members Kay Moxness and Sarah Gayle smooth sailing and welcomed Rob Connell and Chris Graamans to the board.

Our mission would not soar without a dedicated OCCA staff and board that keep our operations and programs moving with commitment, and excellent customer service.

A three-year Miller Foundation grant helped us with our organizational infrastructure, and we now have a new strategic plan to guide us for the next five years and a road map to help us obtain more unrestricted revenues.

Finally, the arts are an economic force in this county and OCCA and Lincoln County arts organizations participated in the American for the Arts Arts and Economic Prosperity 5 national study. (See page 5 for details.)

You will see in these pages that we have had a strong year of service as a local arts council, as well as the regional arts council for the Oregon coast. Over 87,338 individuals benefited from OCCA programming and support. And we made arts experiences possible for tens of thousands of attendees and hundreds of artists in the community and along the coast.

This annual report celebrates our members, volunteers, donors, nonprofit partners, and supporters who all contribute to our mission "to develop, promote and celebrate community arts" a reality in this community, in this county, and along the 363 miles of the Oregon coast. Thank you.

# **2016-17 YEAR IN REVIEW**

Thanks to the support of the OCCA Board, Staff, Volunteers and Members, the community, the City of Newport and local and regional funders, OCCA achieved milestones this past fiscal year that benefit Newport, Lincoln county, and the 363 miles of the Oregon coast. Here are a few highlights from 2016-2017:

#### **NOVEMBER 2016**

OCCA hosts the popular national stage revue The Capitol Steps to benefit the "Entertain the Future!" capital campaign to expand and enhance the Newport Performing Arts Center and the eighth annual Nye Beach Banner Auction at the VAC benefits OCCA's youth arts programming.





### **DECEMBER 2016**

OCCA hosts the 26th Annual PushPin community exhibit & the Visual **Arts Center celebrates** 34 years, with 22 years of arts management under OCCA.





The 2016-17 fiscal year at the Newport Visual Art Center was both intense and rewarding, with increased exhibit programming (26 exhibits total), the development of new spaces and continued building improvements.

### Classroom Gallery, Media Room Established

As part of OCCA's commitment to youth-arts programming, the VAC's smaller classroom and meeting space (Room 302) was re-named the Classroom Gallery, establishing a more formal space for the display of student artwork. While still used as a meeting and rental space, the walls of the "Classroom Gallery" are now adorned with artwork developed in partnership with local schools and nonprofits, or drawn from OCCA's Art Fridays program.

The student exhibit "Rick Bartow: A Tribute" included paintings by Newport Middle School students under the direction of art instructor Erin Price. This exhibit coincided with the "Rick Bartow: A Community Collection" exhibition in the Runyan Gallery, running July through August. The next student exhibit, "Voices of Youth," was organized by Neighbors For Kids under the direction of Krista Eddy and was on view September through late-October. Two additional exhibits were held throughout the year, including work created during the "Art Fridays" fall and winter sessions.

The VAC's new Media Room, a converted darkroom and storage space, enjoyed its first formal screening with "Just Imagine: Work from Newport High School." The 13 short films were produced by students in NHS's video production classes and included public service announcements, short dramas and music videos.

# Landscaping the VAC

7 isitors to the VAC often comment on how well tended the landscaping is around the building—and for good reason. Every Tuesday morning, a dedicated crew from the Coastal Artist Guild gets dirty with the flowers and bushes (and, yes, weeds) that surround the building's exterior. FY16-17 landscapers included six hard-working volunteers (see page 8) who donated over \$2,000 in in-kind services.



# Exhibition Advisory Group

The VAC's Exhibition Advisory Group (EAC) was re-constituted in July 2016. The group meets on the last Tuesday of the month, 5:15pm at the VAC, to review exhibition proposals, discuss current needs, conduct artist and community outreach, and consider gallery policies and protocols. The group works closely with the OCCA VAC Director to maintain the galleries' long-term calendars. (See page 8)

### Let There Be Paint!

The VAC received a nice facelift - or facelifts - at the end of FY16-17, as the City of Newport arranged for the building's exterior to be repainted. Gone went the singular yellow color, and in came two primary colors (denim blue and deep green) and one secondary color (copper), rotating around the building's different sides and faces. New exterior signage and other building improvements are scheduled for FY17-18.



# **Arts & Economic Prosperity 5 – Lincoln County**

new national study by Americans for the Arts finds that the nation's nonprofit arts and culture industry generated \$166.3 billion in economic activity in 2015 - \$63.8 billion in spending by arts and cultural organizations and an additional \$102.5 billion in event-related spending by their audiences. This activity supported 4.6 million jobs and generated \$27.5 billion in government revenue.

Arts & Economic Prosperity 5 (AEP5) is the most comprehensive study of its kind ever conducted. There were 341 study regions (113 cities, 115 counties, 81 multicity or multicounty regions) representing all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Diverse regions ranged in population from 1,500 to four million and type from rural to large urban.

Data was gathered from 14,439 organizations and 212,691 arts event attendees. Economists customized input-output models to calculate specific and reliable findings for each study region.
