FESTIVAL INFORMATION

WORKSHOP REGISTRATION FEES are based on the number of days you take workshops. The more days you take workshops, the less it costs per day.

One Day – \$140 total

Two Days – \$230 total In addition to registration fees, each workshop has a materials fee.

Three Days – \$295 total These are listed in the workshop descriptions.

Four Days – \$360 total

TWO-DAY WORKSHOPS There are seven two-day workshops being offered. When registering for these, select the workshop on both days as your first, second or third choice. These count as two days in registration fees. The materials fee covers both days.

WORKSHOP HOURS All workshops meet from 9:00am until 4:30pm with an hour lunch break at 12:00pm. You *may not* enter your classroom until 8:50am.

ACCESSIBILITY Some classrooms can only be accessed via stairs. These are clearly marked in the workshop descriptions.

HOW TO REGISTER Registration is online **only** via Google Forms. Google Forms instructions and link are on page 25. The time and date stamp will determine your place in the registration queue.

REGISTER EARLY More people are projected to register on the first day than in years past. Include second and third choices. If you do not get into your first choice and have not included second and third choices, you will not be registered for those day(s). The last day to register or change workshops is April 8, 2020.

REGISTRATION CONFIRMATION Within three days of submitting your form, a confirmation packet will be emailed to you. This will include the workshops you are in, materials lists, lunch choices, an itinerary, the total amount due and a link to an online invoice.

PAYMENT Payment is due within 48 hours of receiving your registration confirmation. Payments can be made either by check or credit card (Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover). A link to the invoice will be in your registration packet. If payment is not received or postmarked within 48 hours of your confirmation email, your registration will be forfeited.

WAITING LISTS A waiting list is kept for each workshop equal to the maximum number of students for that workshop. If someone cancels, that spot will be offered to the first person on the waiting list. When a class is WAITLIST ONLY, it is recommended that you provide second and/or third choices. ***See page 25!

REFUND POLICY The Newport Paper & Book Arts Festival is usually oversubscribed, and there are waiting lists. If you cannot attend a workshop for which you have registered, let us know immediately. We will refund your tuition minus a \$45 processing fee. NO REFUNDS AFTER March 16, 2020. The Oregon Coast Council for the Arts reserves the right to cancel workshop(s).


BOOKMAKING: COLLAGE AS CONTENT

Thursday & Friday Two-Day Workshop

Margo Klass

Class Limit:12 Skill Level: Intermediate Materials Fee: \$30







Materials Provided by Instructor: St. Armand paper (for concertina), collage papers (kozo and other papers), book board, book cloth, PVA adhesive, wheat paste, distilled water, thin awls, spacers, mylar, hollytex, embroidery threads, needles, clips, MacTac, 3M double stick tape, boards and clamps, extra tools to share



Materials Provided by Student: Cutting mat (minimum 18" x 14"), cutting knife with extra blades, bone folder, scoring bone folder, see-through quilter's rulers (assorted lengths and widths if available), PVA glue brush (3/4 - 1" stiff bristle, round or flat), wheat paste brush (3/4 - 1" flat acrylic brush, with bristles softer than the PVA brush), small weights, tweezers, small metal spatula, small spoon (1/2-1 tsp), pencil, eraser, small sharp scissors, small short glass jar with lid, another glass container to hold distilled water, glue papers (40 pieces, 8.5 x 11" scrap paper to use when putting glue on paper to protect surface of mat/table)

Optional: graduated metal edges (highly recommended), personal collage papers (light weight), needle threader, plastic container to collect bits of paper, personal light

ECO PRINTING AND THE ARTIST'S BOOK FULL

Rebecca Chamlee

Class Limit: 12 Skill Level: All Materials Fee: \$50



Directly printing forms found in the natural world has been used for centuries by scientists, naturalists and artists to preserve the ephemeral beauty of nature. This workshop explores the botanical contact-printing process (eco printing) to create images on paper with leaves and plant materials. On the first day, learn botanical contact printing with immersion techniques using dye baths on assorted papers. On the second day, use your finished papers to create four non-adhesive books: a simple Jacob's Ladder, two hybrid structures based on the Accordion and a Long Stitch sewn book, all filled with rich visual content.

Materials Provided by Instructor: assorted paper, buttons, clothesline and clothespins, dye and mordants, electric hotplates, large cooking pots, leaves, measuring cups and spoons, pans for soaking paper and leaves, spine leather, string, thread, tongs, tools, whisk

Materials Provided by Student: apron, bone folder, book binding needle, cutting mat, leaves - fresh (placed between magazine pages to keep flat) and/or dried and flattened (will be rehydrated in class), metal ruler or straight edge for measuring and cutting (12"-


18"), small awl or bodkin, X-Acto knife and #11 blade or Olfa knife, Leaves that work: oaks, maples, sweet gum and blackberry.

Optional:

Japanese screw punch with 1.5mm bit

THE FINE ART OF COLLAGE WAITLIST ONLY

Arlene Warner

Class Limit:14 Skill Level: All Materials Fee: \$30



Learn how to create unique and expressive abstract works using collage. Handmade painted collage papers, repurposed scraps and various ephemera are layered and combined with acrylic paint and mark-making to produce textured and intuitive art pieces. On the first day, create painted papers using a variety of fun and simple techniques, including monoprinting with a Gelli Arts plate. On the second day, your papers become the foundation of your collages as you add other paper elements and use acrylic paint to fill spaces and create backgrounds. You assemble several collage pieces concurrently. Greeting cards with small collages are made as time allows.

Materials Provided by Instructor: 5" square Gelli Arts printing plate (yours to keep), big box of scraps including paper scraps, postage stamps, pieces of art papers and other eclectic printed items, drawing paper and deli paper for creating handpainted sheets to be used in final collages, fluid acrylic paints in a variety of colors, individual containers of matte medium, 90-lb fine-art printmaking paper, various materials to create patterns and textures

Materials Provided by Student: soft rubber brayer (2"), paint brushes (two inexpensive acrylic 1" or wider), palette knife, paper palette pad or stack of waxed

paper, pencils, scissors, black pens/markers (waterproof Pitt pens work best), water container (large yogurt size)

Optional: paper scraps - pages from old books, journals, postage stamps, printed tissue paper or napkins - anything that speaks to your visual aesthetic, rubber stamps and other small items to create textures and patterns

Take off your finished roof top and open the door for the big reveal!

Materials Provided by Instructor: awls, board, bone folders, bookcloth, buttons, coordinating decorative paper, cord, cutting mats, glue cards, knives, pencils, PVA, scissors, wax paper

Learn this rare binding technique to create an articulated blank journal that can beautifully withstand the ravages of time. This binding is inspired by Italy's 1970's solution to broken Yellow Pages bindings in public phone booths. The 360-degree flexible binding offers many advantages because it bends and does not break! Plus, it is a visual and tactile delight, employing strips of articulated hard board covered with Pietro's marbled fabric.

Materials Provided by Instructor: binding materials, glue, marbled bookcloth

Materials Provided by Student: apron, baby wipes, cutting mat (medium sized), glue brush (2" or preferred size), ruler (12"-18"), X-Acto knife and blades

This workshop is a true introduction to the world of handmade books. Learn the vocabulary and all about paper, its qualities and how to accurately measure, cut and fold it. PVA and other adhesives will be introduced along with proper gluing techniques and covering book boards. Make and use a jig for placement of holes for sewing, and learn how to handle waxed linen thread and how to sew simple bindings. Use your new knowledge to make four books: a Concertina Folded Book with hard cover, an Australian Piano Hinge folded and glued book as developed by Alisa Golden, a little 3-hole Pamphlet Stitch memo book and a Japanese Stab Binding booklet.

Materials Provided by Instructor: all paper for practice and projects, foam core for piercing platforms, glue, glue brushes, glue containers, needles, T-pins for piercing, waxed linen thread, waxed paper and paper for gluing, weights for drying glued pieces

Materials Provided by Student: (see picture) bone folder, eraser, paper towels, old washcloths or baby wipes, pencil, ruler (cork backed 18"-24"), self-healing cutting mat (around 19"x13"), small sharp scissors, water container, X-Acto knife (or similar) with replacement blades

Books that open flat to display your individual collages or other works of art that you want to self publish, or keep organized permanently, are always fun to explore and create. The spider-bound book does just that. When the book is looked at on end, you see the spider with its head (the spine) and the legs (the pages). Not only do you create the spider bound book, but you create collages to fill the pages. Join us for this exciting one-day workshop.

Materials Provided by Instructor: breakoff knives, cover paper, ephemera, glue sticks, graphite pencils, matte medium, mixed media materials, paint, paper cutter, photos

Materials Provided by Student: baby wipes, paper towels, ruler (12"-18"), scissors

Optional: cutting mat (medium size), favorite brand of glue sticks

PAPER JEWELRY Cheri Aldrich Class Limit:14

Friday One-Day Workshop

Materials Fee: \$28

Skill Level: All

Create one-of-a-kind paper earrings, necklaces, bracelets and pins using Cheri's surface-designed papers from her 25+ year personal stash. Learn basic wire work techniques for assembling the jewelry. Explore multiple ways to cut paper shapes, add texture and dimensions, and assemble them into professional-quality pieces. Receive a kit of prepared papers, ear wires, beads, metal components, wire, cording, shape dies and all other parts needed to finish multiple pieces. Leave with a stash to complete more at home.

Materials Provided by Instructor: beads, bracelet and necklace forms, colored pens, dapping blocks and hammer, dies for earring shapes, embossing machine, extra wire work tools, foam drying racks, glues, hole punches, kit of findings, paper cutter, papers, silk wipe, specialty papers, toothpicks, wire (small kits of more findings will be available for purchase to students who wish to make more as many of these materials are difficult to obtain elsewhere)

Materials Provided by Student: awl, baby wipes, cutting mat (small to medium), glue brushes (several ¼" and ½"), ruler (12"-18" see-through quilting works best), scissors (regular and small curved detail scissors are very helpful), X-Acto knife and extra blades,

hand tools (see picture) - (1) needle nose pliers, (2) wire cutters, (3) bent nose or chain nose pliers (flat channel) (Cheri has a few extra tools to share if you can't find these, but please email her ahead of time so she knows what to bring)

Optional: extra beads and findings, favorite surface-designed papers (small and or scraps), hole punches (1/8" and 1/16"), Japanese screw punch with smallest bits

Class Limit: 14 Skill Level: All Materials Fee: \$25



This class is an introduction to the ancient technique of making papyrus. Fruits and vegetables are laminated together to form translucent sheets, each providing the opportunity to explore light, texture and patterns. You are encouraged to play with your food and discover the complex beauty and natural wonder of common/uncommon fruits and vegetables. Participants are responsible for attending to their press several times a day, tapering off as the papyrus dries. Presentation options as well as bookmaking applications are discussed.



Materials Provided by Instructor: boards, bowls, clamps, clothesline and pins, colanders, compost bucket, concrete blocks, cooking pots, cotton squares, cutting boards, fruits and vegetables, hand towels, knives, masking tape, microwaves, newsprint squares, peelers,

pens, presses, sample books, slicing mandolins, small fan, tongs

Materials Provided by Student: apron, microwaveable bowls (2qt and 4qt), non-serrated knives (3"-4" and 7"-10") (extra supplies are available for those not able to travel with equipment, please email Susan ahead of time, so she knows what to bring)

Optional: plant press, slicing mandolin, special fruit/vegetables you would like to try (tomatoes, cabbage family vegetables and bananas **do not** work)

MOSAIC COLLAGE WITH SILHOUETTE AND IMAGE TRANSFER

All skill levels can experience success in this joyful exploration of mosaic collage design and image transfer. Students use colored art tissue, acrylic paint and stenciling to create a gallery-wrapped canvas piece in the shape and color-combinations of their

choice. A variety of nature silhouette images are provided to choose as a focal point.

Materials Provided by Instructor: acrylic paints, collage paper, images, pencils, rulers, scissors, stencils, wood panel substrate

THE ACCORDION—ENDLESS POSSIBILITIES

Saturday & Sunday Two-Day Workshop

Class Limit:12 Materials Fee: \$40 Skill Level: Beginner-Intermediate



For Hedi Kyle, the simple accordion fold became a catalyst to create wonderful folded book structures, and her mastery of it opened endless creative possibilities for all of us. Using her techniques, measure, cut and fold to make perfect accordion folds. Discuss joining methods and papers used to create specific effects. You make three of her structures: a Pocket Accordion Book, that allows you to organize and/or display various small things in the five pockets created; a hardcover Flag Book, a simple accordion with interlocking pages oriented in opposite directions, that expand and retract as the book opens and closes; and a Panorama Book, which Kyle calls a "portable gallery" because a freestanding accordion creates a structure with broad, flat panels on which to create a visual gallery.

Materials Provided by Instructor: boards, double-sided tape, embellishing materials, MacTac, needles, paper, piercing block, punches, PVA glue, waxed linen thread

Materials Provided by Student: bone or Teflon folder, bone scorer, book-binding awl, cutting knife with extra blades, cutting mat (preferably 18"x24"), eraser, glue papers (25 pieces 8.5" x 11" scrap paper to use when putting glue on paper to protect surface of mat/table), glue stick (Elmer's Extra Strength UHU, or wheat paste stick), pencil, rulers (2 or 3 - 18"-24" - clear quilting rulers preferred, but metal will work), scissors

Optional: graduated metal edges, weights (covered brick or heavy book)

Class Limit:12 Skill Level: All Materials Fee: \$50

In this creative and transforming two-day workshop, learn how to use the magic tool every artist should have, the amazing Dremel. Learn how to drill, cut, carve, etch, shape, polish and grind non-traditional book-making and craft materials, such as glass, plastic, metals, clay, wood, tile and more. After this class the material options for your projects will be limitless. Try your hand at working with various materials and learning how to use the numerous bits for different purposes and effects. As you play with the different materials, you make pages for your sample book for later reference. This workshop is great for book artists, printmakers, jewelers, sculptors or anyone wanting to do "stuff" to materials beyond paper and fabric.

Materials Provided by Instructor: materials to complete book (pages, cover, spine, binding), precut materials for class (glass, mirror, tile, wood, metals, polymer, plexiglass, etc.), wood case kit of 228 various rotary bits for the Dremel Tool (or other rotary brand) for working most all materials (yours to keep)

This introduction to the art of marbling provides you with an understanding of the history, styles, tools and techniques of classical European marbling. Learn the foundational elements, acquisition and proper use of the supplies, including carrageenan, primer, paints, trays, rakes and combs. Pietro demonstrates how marbling is executed, how to handle paints on the water medium, and deal with known and unknown variables, and how to create classical and basic marbling patterns (as well as spontaneous designs). You have your own tray, with water medium you mixed, set of paints, rakes combs and primed paper with ample time to practice and experiment with personal guidance from Pietro. Students usually leave with 15-25 of their own original marbled pieces. Please note that paper marbling is a wet process and papers made at the workshop may not be dry at the end of class.



Materials Provided by Instructor: big box of scraps (including painted paper scraps, postage stamps, pieces of art papers and other eclectic printed items), cloth for the spine, drawing paper and other papers for interior journal pages and smooth, fluid acrylic paints in a variety of colors, heavy needles and thread, heavy-weight paper for covers, individual containers of matte medium, saddle-stitch stapler, various materials to create patterns and textures

A fun part of a workshop is taking all your cool tools. It is even better to keep them organized in a *Book Artists' Tool Book*. You can keep this book as simple as a folder or needlebook, or you can add pockets for your bonefolder/ruler/blade and make it a little more challenging. We make bookcloth, cover our boards, add pockets and an elastic closure, insert our spine and stitch in the felt pages. If you want pockets in your book, bring your tools with you. Tools must be less than 6.5" long (see picture for ideas).

Materials Provided by Instructor: book board, bricks, brushes, elastic, fabrics, felt, fusible web, glue, irons, mats, needles, paper, rulers

Materials Provided by Student: bone folder, cutting mat (medium size), metal ruler (12"-18"), notebook, pencil, X-Acto knife and extra blades

Optional: 3" triangle ruler (like X-Acto 7725), clear grid ruler (6" - 12" bar or a 4"x 12"), items for toolbook (see picture for ideas, must be less than 6.5" long), scissors or rotary cutter for fabric, weights (covered bricks or heavy books)

Japanese stab binding is a great way to bind individual art papers. In this workshop we create three Japanese stab-bound books using three different patterns. 
